Last meeting, you missed Something



Marla Blair, Public speaker at various events, Guide and author of "Positive Fly Fishing" spoke at our October meeting. Her fly fishing guiding services and instruction are tailored for private, group, and or kid lessons. She offers either full or half day in CT on the Farmington River or MA on the Swift, Deerfield, Westfield or Farmington Rivers.

Our show was a modification of a presentation she had given for a group of boy scouts.

First off, when handling trout make sure that your hands are wet and never gill a fish that you plan on releasing. Fish will bite for hunger, territory or curiosity. Your fly choice when imitating life, important points are: size-shapecolor-and behavior; so keep in mind that subtle copies of food are better than exact copies. First choice for trout will be bottom feeding; think safety and all insect emergence can be seen as starting on the bottom. On bright sunny days first thoughts should be nymphing along the bottom. A case in point is the comfortable temperatures Hendrickson hatch at is 48° F. Trout need 50°-52°F and they won't actively rise if the water is too cold. Indicator nymph fishing was covered; enhanced with 2 spaced sinkers the flies are more active in the currents. When cast, mend the line immediately and during the drift mend twice

up stream.

<u>Subsurface</u> feeding can be splashy takes for insects about to leave the water. For these times a dry fly with the hackle trimmed across the bottom actively twitched across the surface can attract the trout's attention.

<u>Surface</u> feeding is sipping ripples and will mean that a collection of rusty spinners from size 20-10 will need a look through; the Hendrickson will need a yellow egg bundle and the sulfur spinners (yellow of course) will be the choices.

In the late fall of 2012 my wife and I were in Nashville Tenn. In the downtown area the state has quite a bit to see with water fountains granite monuments to define all the time that has gone by and telling you what happened during the different time periods. There is also a cement map of Tennessee that is one block long and beautifully done. And there was a state information office. Sandy and I walked in and the 2 employees there were very excited to have someone to talk to. The young lady asked if there was something I was interested in, I told her how the state information centers on the highway had each part of the state broken down and plenty of broachers' to read on everything. Except state campgrounds and fresh water fishing. The young lady very excitedly asked me if I wanted to know her favorite place to fish where she would catch big fish, immediately I said YES! She told me to get a map and proceeded to write down some streets and areas I should make my way to when I got to eastern Tenn. Needless to say I put that map in a safe place till Thanksgiving week when I was fishing the South Holston River and took a day to find my way to the Nolichucky river. When I got to a nearby town of Irwin I went into the library and asked the librarian if she knew anything about fishing she said no, when I asked the second one she told me to get back on the highway and go to the next exit and go to the local hotel. So that's what I did and that's where I met Melissa. When I walked in she jumped up and asked me if she could help me with a room, I smiled and told her I felt foolish coming in but what I was trying to find out was where to fish the Nolichucky river. Mellissa beamed got all excited and said do you wade fish? Do you were those rubber pants? I said yes to both questions, she said you must fish with my grandpa! And gave me his number. I felt a bit awkward about that and smiled and said perhaps you should call grandpa and ask him if he wants to take me fishing? She said sure and did it was so funny listening to her describe me and tell him how I fished in rubber pants and like to wade. She smiled at me and said he wanted to take me fishing, at that I took the phone and said hi to grandpa and introduced myself and reminded Tom I was a Yankee, he said he knew that and it was not a problem. He also said it was a bit cold and asked me to call back in a few days when it warmed up a bit, no problem I said. A week later I called and got to speak with Tom and set up a day. As always I brought lunch for my host and got there a bit early. Tom wanted to show me 2 spots in case he left I would know another spot to fish. What happens here is the hatchery in the fall stocks the older breeder rainbows that are no longer needed; they do this when the water is cold as this river is a smallmouth fishery in warmer weather. Tom and I fished a big pool together he with a lure me with woolly bugger. My host did much better than I in that he landed all of the fish he hooked while I hooked and lost most of mine. The fish were all big and beautiful, lunch on the side of the river was great as it always is and Tom and I got to know each other a bit more. A week later we fished again and this time my reflexes were much better and we worked our way through the pool several times. It was early December and the temperature hit close to 70 so it was like an early fall day in New England. I stayed with a woolly bugger and did very well knowing that my old best friend Terp was watching me. Back in 1987 Terp and I met and he introduced me to the woolly bugger and it has never failed me that December day was my last day of trout fishing for 2012 and it was very memorable. Tom and I had another great streamside lunch shared some stories and he invited me to fish for Red's in Florida in winter when he goes. I said that would be great and another fishing friendship was formed. My friend Teddy calls the way I meet people and have great fishing good Karma from some of the things I have done in my life. Whatever it is, I'm sure glad I have it

Trout in the Classroom (TIC)



TIC State wide: 102 schools in Connecticut are participating in the program with 8,000 kids directly involved.

TIC Massachusetts: will be expanding with the state wide ending of the salmon in the classroom. The program is expected to hatch and raise Brook trout using the equipment already on hand.

Durham Fair / Hammo festival results promoting TIC: Durham Fair had attendance of +200,000 people and more than 200 flies tied by kids over the four day event. Next year this will be a better event only if you want it to be; so join us at the fair and make it better.

Hammo festival was two days bait rod "back yard bass" casting and fly tying for +130 kids.

<u>TIC egg distribution</u> took place on November 17th with 22,000 eggs sent out to all of the schools in the program.


